June 7

Memorial Hospital opened its doors

with a bed capacity of 223 and a full range of inpatient and outpatient services. The capital project was \$7.75 million. Funds breakdown: 14% Bank Loans, 31% donations (from individuals and local companies), 55% Hill Burton Act funds.

and approved by the Commonwealth of Virginia State Corporation Commission following the sale of Memorial Health System (Memorial Hospital of Martinsville).


August 16

(formerly XYZ Foundation) and approved by the Commonwealth of Virginia State Corporation Commission. The sale generated approximately \$150 million to seed the foundation.

July 1

The Smith River Sports Complex opens to the public.

A community-wide grand opening was held Aug. 23, 2009. The \$8.7 million project includes multiple soccer fields, fixed seating, a pavilion and many more amenities. Henry County donated 91 acres for the project.

March 15

A 5-year grant of \$4.56 million launches

The Martinsville-Henry County Coalition for Health and Wellness to improve access to healthcare for the uninsured, and to provide health education and wellness programs for MHC residents.

2021 grants recap

West Piedmont Planning District \$75,000, 3 Years

This three-year grant funds a housing planner to facilitate ongoing regional discussions around housing challenges and generate attainable solutions.

Martinsville-Henry County
Economic Development Corp.
\$7 million, 4.5 Years

This grant over four and a half years continues Martinsville-Henry County's upward trajectory of job creation, wage growth, and tourism.

Piedmont Arts \$100,000, 1 Year

This one-year grant supports the museum's Growth + Restoration Capital Campaign, building a better museum for a vibrant community. Renovations will include upgrades to the buildings and grounds, including state-of-the-art lighting and climate control systems.

Patrick & Henry Community College \$10.3 million, 13 Years

This grant guarantees that the SEED Fund at P&HCC will continue for the next 13 years. All students beginning with the 2021 kindergarten class will have access to a college education at no cost to them and their families.

Henry County Food Pantry \$15,000 (Pick up the Pace!)

This one-time grant supported the 2021 Thanksgiving Holiday Meal Distribution.

Uptown Partnership \$11,276 (Pick up the Pace!)

This one-time grant extended the decorative street banners in the City of Martinsville along the Fayette Street corridor.


Martinsville-Henry County SPCA \$15,000 (Pick up the Pace!)

This one-time grant supported operations at the SPCA's spay and neuter clinic, designed to provide basic care for shelter animals, and serve residents with financial barriers. The clinic also provides education for future veterinarians and support staff.

February 23

The Philpott Marina opens all boat slips

rented and about a dozen people added to the waiting list. The Harvest Foundation contributed \$418,138 to the project along with contributions from Henry County, and the Martinsville-Henry County EDC.



Construction of New College Institute

on the Dana O. Baldwin Block is completed. The ultra-modern, 52,000-square-foot facility was a \$18 million project funded in part by the Virginia Tobacco Commission, The Harvest Foundation, and private donors and grants.

June 26

The Harvest Youth Board is created

with 13 area teenagers. Its mission is to develop projects and initiatives that are important to young people in Martinsville-Henry County.

The Harvest Youth Board holds its first signature event,

the Thanksgiving Eve Dinner with dozens of volunteers. The group provided 1,704 dinners to an estimated 322 area residents.



Financial Report

The Harvest Foundation was established in 2002 with assets exceeding \$153.3 million. At the end of 2021, assets grew to more than \$276 million.

Total grants paid for The Harvest Foundation in 2021 were \$7.58 million. A total of 17 grants were approved, and grant funding awarded and announced was \$26,842,235.
